What keeps children and youth safe, ultimately, is not a policy and a set of procedures, regardless of how carefully crafted and honored in practice.

A policy is but one part of a **congregational culture** in which people, as disciples of Jesus Christ,

- care about children and youth,
- actively commit to their well-being,
- recognize risks,
- learn from experience,
- and hold each other accountable.



Do not place all
responsibility on
one person



Do engage the **whole**
congregation.

(Jesus sent the disciples
out together. Mark 6:7)



Do not simply copy another Session's policy.

Do honor God's unique call of mission and ministry to **your** congregation.



Like Job, you'll have a lot of comforters who will give you different opinions.



Do trust those with expertise who honor *best practices*.

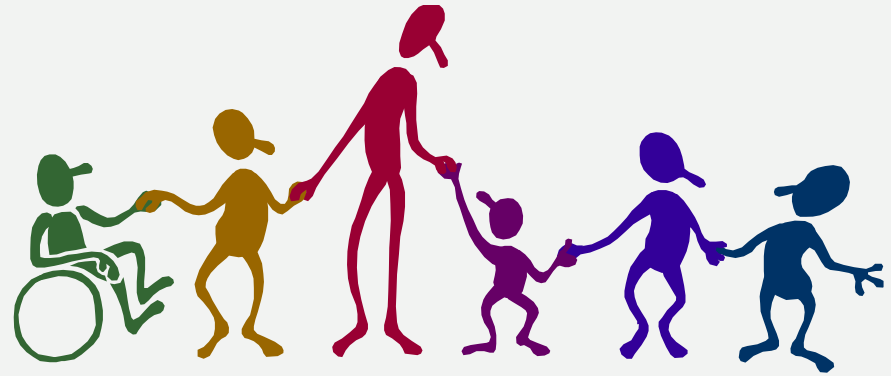

- A school nurse, counselor, or social worker; police personnel who work with juveniles...

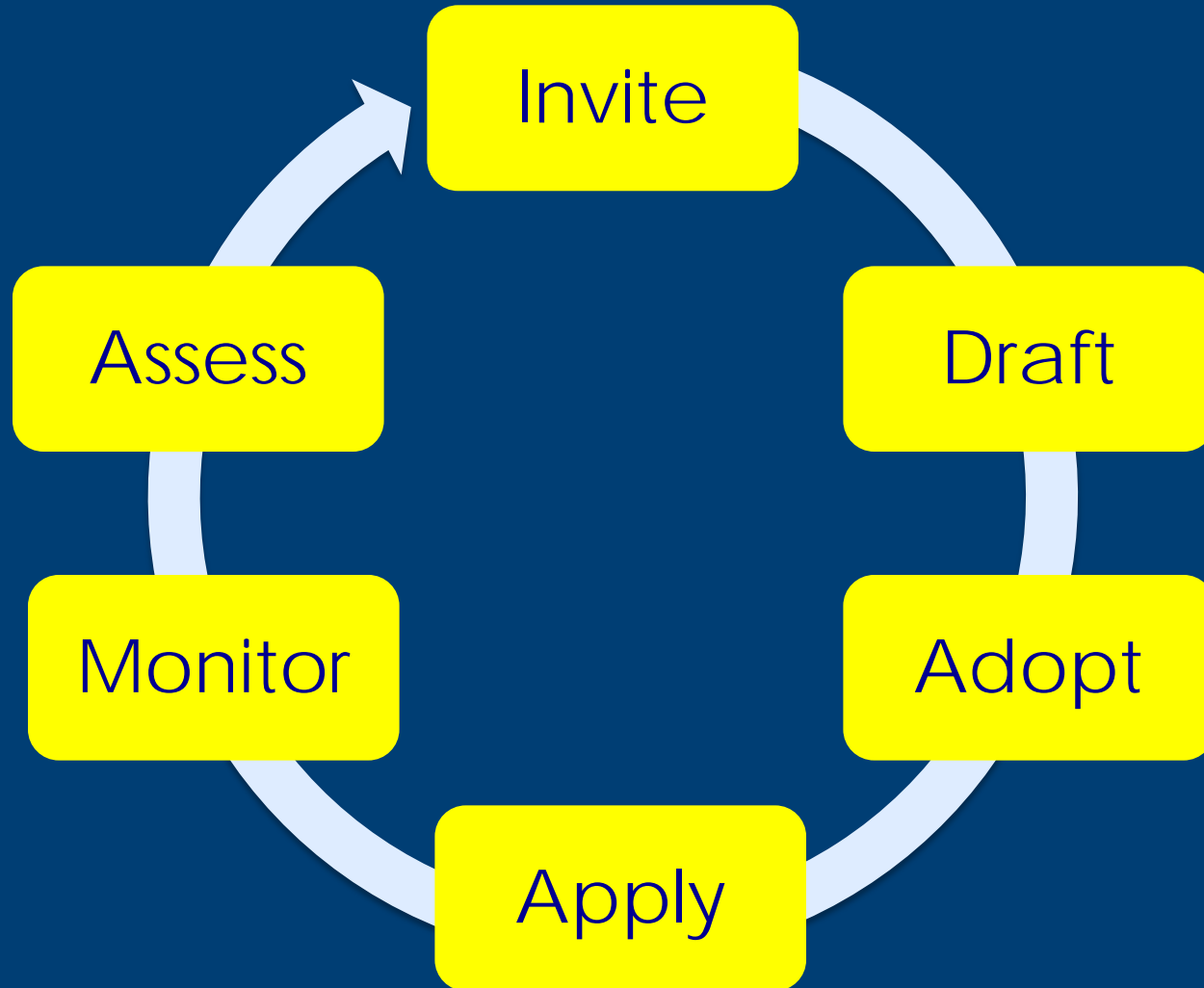
Trust those with expertise and experience.

For a congregation, it's more than a set of rules. A policy is a living covenant.

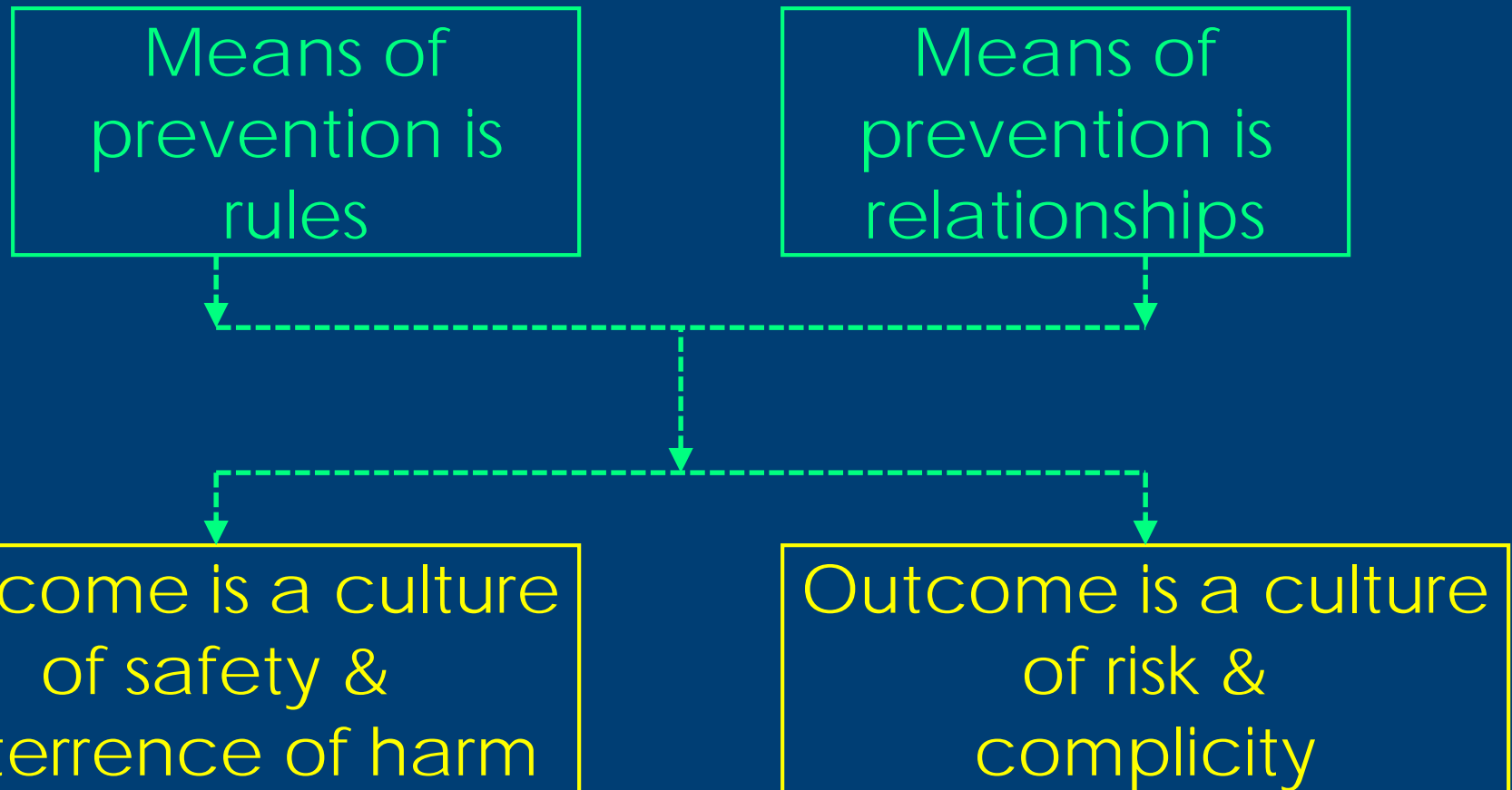
Trust the process, trust the Spirit
